

What makes a good record?



Making a record: 4 Key things - Who? What? Where? When?

Who?

Write your name preferably in the format Mr Joe Bloggs and please send us details so we can contact you, ideally a phone number and email if possible - **your details will not be passed on**.

What?

State what species you have seen, or seen signs of - it does not matter if you know the Scientific name or not. If you can send a *photo* as well that will be even better.

Where?

This is very important in helping to make sure your record can be verified. *All* records have to be verified to ensure we do not duplicate or collect inaccurate information, so having a detailed location and photograph can help immensely.

Providing a grid reference of *6 figures or more* is much more valuable at helping with location than a post code. Don't worry it doesn't have to be complicated to get a grid reference.

- If you are used to using OS maps then you can work out your Grid reference from that.

When?

The date of a record, written in the format dd/mm/yyyy, is also important for records. The time of day (08:00) can be useful, but is not critical if you cannot remember.

Further Comments

Any further comments about the location and/or the species you spotted may help with your record.
